



What Are The Millards **Doing Now?**

In 1998 Judy and Aubrey Millard set out in Veleda to sail until they got tired of it. So far, they are still sailing. Currently in the Gulf of Mexico, here are some reports from Aubrey (the chronicler) that he places before his latest formal logs sent by email. After hundreds of logs, they are still coming. Here are some of his latest observations in reverse chronological order.

> Feb. 4, 2012 Hi Folks.

We changed our minds and stayed put until Monday Feb. 6, thus you are getting at least two logs in a row. Today is rainy and I am getting caught up on my logs. Our present plans are to stay until Monday, check out with the Capitan del Puerto and Immigration, two separate locations in town, then shove off for an overnight sail to Puerto Allen in Bahia de la Ascencion, 100 miles south on the Yucatan.

> Feb. 3, 2012 Hi Folks,

This is a short log, getting us into the ICW down to Albemarle Sound. I want to get it off before we leave tomorrow after spending an enjoyable two weeks here in Isla Mujeres. From anchor we have dinghied into town many times to take the ferry over to Cancun for bureaucratic paper work and several trips to Mayan ruins and up to Contoy, a bird sanctuary, as well as a couple of enjoyable snorkeling opportunities. We like Isla Mujeres better than the hotel strips of Cancun. Hopefully tomorrow we will head down past Cozumel towards Belize (if we can complete the exit paper work for which we will have to pay overtime as it will be a Saturday). It will take a

few days to get there, and because we are checking out of Mexico from here, we will not be able to stop at any marinas en route. We enjoyed Marina Paraiso which helped us do our entry and exit paperwork. We stayed there only two nights, but were welcomed to use their facilities including WiFi while we were out at anchor a few hundred vards from the marina. Thanks Marina Paraiso!

It may be a week or more before we are in WiFi contact again in Belize. The trade winds are heavy here, constantly between 10 to 20 knots from the east or southeast. We need to hug the shoreline to stay out of the Gulf Stream as it streams up the Yucatan Channel.

> Jan. 27, 2012 Hi Folks.

We are still enjoying the warm weather of Mexico. Judy at last has her ideal climate where getting up in the morning just involves putting on a bathing suit. We are off to some Mayan ruins tomorrow from Cancun, before we leave this area. No pictures with this log, as I have misplaced the album with them. I hope I can find it for my

All is well with us and *Veleda*.

Ianuary 23, 2012 Hi Folks.

We are here in Mexico after a 300 mile passage from the Dry Tortugas to Isla Mujeres, near Cancun on the east side of the Yucatan Peninsula here in Mexico. This log gets us to the south end of the Chesapeake, before crossing over to Norfolk and into the Intra Coastal Waterway (ICW). Hopefully I will be able to send this off later today as the marina has WiFi access. I have written it over a period of time, starting when we were in Key West, then in the Dry Tortugas, and finally here in Isla Mujeres, Mexico. The weather is hot (28 C, or 90 F).

WOW—Women On the Water will be hosted once again by The Store Mason's Chandlery over a Sunday 10am – 3pm at Mason's in Port Credit for women only. The seminars cover such topics as anchoring, man-overboard procedures, docking, and knot tying.

Lori Mason, creator of the WOW program has been doing safety seminars since 1985. "I thought it was a great idea when I was approached to do a seminar just for women. Traditionally, women boaters have been pre-occupied with galley duties and their children, and never really get a chance to get behind the wheel of the boat" said Mason. "Any boater can end up in a May Day situation and some women might find themselves without the knowledge and the skill to help their families."

WOW seminars are designed to be both educational and fun. The series is designed to teach women how to react to basic May Day situations such as shooting off flares; manoeuvring vessels in MOB situations; calling on the radio; and recognizing their positions. As well, basic boat handling skills such as how to dock; knot tying; mooring and anchoring are covered after lunch.

"The more informed women become and the more boating skills they acquire, the more fun they'll have boating" says Mason. "I am hoping that these WOW seminars will encourage more women to take on an active role in skippering their own boat'.
