



# THE PERILS OF PEREGRINE

## The Perils of Peregrine Episode 1 – 17

Our adventure this year started with a twist. Instead of flying direct to Sint Maarten (SXM) we rejoined our friends Lynn & Derek in Antigua on their Catana 47 *Out-Rageous*.

The plan was to sail to SXM via Barbuda. Of course the wind didn't get the memo.

We arrived on Wednesday the 11th and the wind shifted to out of the North. While there we had gotten an email from friends on a Leopard 40 saying "Your boat is in the water! When are you arriving?" The wind shifted enough that we could finally leave on Tuesday the 17th. Derek and Lynn had friends flying into SXM on the 19th so it was go-or-else time.

The seas were two metres plus with 18 knots of apparent wind. Unfortunately those swells were barely aft of beam. It was truly a bouncy ride. We were already not having a good time when the bilge alarm went off. Thinking we knew what it was we pumped the starboard bilge only to find out it was the port one and disaster had struck.

Catanas have a very large opening port on the inside of the bows that opens on the aft edge. Somehow the sea pounding had loosened the dogs enough it had opened and we were definitely wet. Here of course is where the fun begins. We are still four hours from SXM and all our luggage is in the forward cabin...most of it now soaking wet from salt water. As we passed the shelter of St Barts I, at least, could go down below and sift through the damage. Since we had packed for airlines baggage handling in plastic bags etc. the only severe casualties were Mike's laptop and the electronic baggage scale. Virtually all the clothes and new bedding were wringing wet and destined for the laundry.

We made the five o'clock bridge into the lagoon and went to customs to check in. No such luck! A power failure had forced an early closure of the office. We ran up the Q flag, opened the wine and sat down to some scrumptious chili Lynn had put away in the freezer. We finished sorting the

disaster and called it a night.

Next morning the boys went off to customs to clear us into the island and off *Out-Rageous*. I took all the laundry over to the laundry lady's beautiful new digs and got my welcome back hug. Then Lynn and I started in on the cleaning of the salt water. While I was wiping down the entire port hull Lynn worked on the V-berth cushions and covers. She now has the cleanest interior hull in the islands. From ceiling to the bottom of the locker under the V-berth that salt water got everywhere.

Mike and Derek returned from customs and tried to get our dinghy in service but, of course, the engine didn't want to start. But my new professionally made dinghy chaps are gorgeous! Eventually it is determined that the "straw" that goes down into the gas can has disconnected. Funny how a lack of fuel will impede the proper functioning of an outboard.

After lunch Mike and I started settling into *Peregrine* while Derek and Lynn sorted out their new dinghy and "cooker" ordered from Budget Marine. *Peregrine* was not however on her own ball but on a borrowed ball. A tour of the balls with Mike Disch (who looks after *Peregrine* for us when we're not on her) determined that our ball had not moved, it was missing! After an extremely busy day both boats met up for a delicious Thai dinner on shore.

Move in is always entertaining as you dance between cleaning and stowing. Mike salvaged an abandoned ball pulled to shore at our neighbours and \$250 later for new chain we were back in business vs \$2100 for a new mooring.

It was just as well we were not quite ready to go though since Lee arrived with the plague. We were sure we were going to find him trying to stuff his lung back into his chest. Wednesday Deb and I went to the ladies luncheon. Nice lunch, good conversation with fellow lady cruisers followed by a swim in a pool and HOT shower with all the water you might want. Mike puttered and Lee suffered. I note here that this was my first swim of the season and not even in the sea!

Over the next few days we finished the provisioning, cleaning and a few of Mike's chores. It took all four of us to get the main on but we won. Sunday night we headed to our shore side neighbours for a barbecue dinner. As usual Dyana did not disappoint. We had to take Deb back to the boat early though since Lee had graciously shared his germs.

Monday we finally left the lagoon clearing the 4 pm bridge. Off we headed for the horrifically long (3 mile) trek to Philipsburg.

Sitting in Philipsburg we are waiting again for the wind to abate so we can leave the island. Not sure when or where, more next time.

Trinidad. Stage one to Trinidad is a

lovely sail down to Grenada, where we



explored a couple of methods of pest control, just to avoid the further trip south.

While there we met up with Jeff and June Ante. Played Mexican Train dominoes on the beach at Hogg Island and generally enjoyed ourselves. Also while we were at Hogg Island, we bumped into Bill Asseltine (sp) an ex member of TH&SC from the '80s. He has a catamaran and is now based out of St Lucia.

We explored several options in Grenada but ultimately opted for, and found that the spray method to kill off the termites didn't work.

On Feb 1st Beach House left Grenada for the overnight hop to Trinidad. It's about 90 miles and took Beach House about 14 hours. It is best to arrive in daylight and allow an hour or so to clear into the country. When Beach House left the customs dock for the short trip,100 yards, across the channel to it's dock the steering failed. APPY NEW YEAR to all, George here reporting on property stuff.

There was a plan to replace the parquet flooring in the dining room; NOT happening this year, probably next winter. As well as the flooring behind the bar area. The delay is based on correctly determining where exactly the water/moisture ingress is getting in under the floor. We will have a better idea this coming spring and will keep you all informed. The new water heater will be moved into the furnace room when the weather warms up and way before launch. Vent and intake stacks for the water heater need to go through the roof and we would want this done in warmer weather. Once moved we can start working on the kitchen and cleaning that area up.

The light green bin marked GFL is for recycling and the darker green one marked Waste Management is for garbage. Signage will be in place soon.

The fridge in the back hallway has been unplugged for the winter. The dishwasher in the kitchen has been unplugged and is to be used as necessary. And must be cleaned, emptied and unplugged after use during the winter.

The door to the electrical room in the kitchen needs to stay open during the winter allowing circulation of

warm air there.

The washrooms at back of the clubhouse next to the bar have been shut down for the winter. These doors need to remain open to ensure proper air circulation there too.

We should not be plugging in our boats during the winter unless you are there during the duration thereof. That is, if one is at the club for the day or many hours, sure, plug your boat in and unplug it before you leave.

The bobcat and forklift are in the process of being repaired and spiffed up for the coming season. Needless to emphasize that doing so will cost much money. Care will need to be exercised in the future to maintain these tools and keep them up to snuff.

There will be a workshop this Spring for those of us who want/need to learn how to use the bobcat and forklift and do a proper circle check before use; eg: check oil, coolant etc. et al. And only those signed off as "competently capable" will be allowed to use the bobcat and forklift.

There is going to be a lot of landscaping work done in the spring because of the seawall work, as well as repairing the timbers around the garden beds. The grass bordering the boardwalk and parking lot will not be replaced. Curbstones will be placed next to the boardwalk in the parking lot, thereby extending parking space and providing a barrier to vehicles.

The grass around the Club House will need some re-seeding and landscape attention too.
