


The jobs are (with approximate dates):






FLEET CAPTAIN CRUISING

CREW WANTED

E are presently on a mooring buoy in Bahia del Sol, El Salvador. Judy will be flying back home the beginning of February, and I will be taking *Veleda* 2300 NM up to Puerto Penasco, Mexico to put it on a truck to be shipped to Chicago, some time in mid-February.

I am sending this to a few friends whom I trust as reliable sailing crew, and may have some time available in mid-February for a two to three week (1055 NM) passage from El Salvador to Barra del Navidad in Mexico. I will be stopping in Puerto Chiapas, Mexico to enter the country, with a few days stop in Acapulco, and a few other short anchorages to obtain fuel. Most legs of the passage will be between 120 to 240 NM. The estimated speed of advance for Veleda IV my Ontario 32 is 100 NM in a 24 hour period. Barra is accessible to an international airport a taxi ride away.

I will remain at anchor in Barra del Navidad until mid March when I will need crew for another two to three week passage from there up to the northern end of the Sea of Cortez, Puerto Penasco. On this 1050 NM passage, I will be stopping at Puerto Vallarta and Mazatlan, as well as a few overnight anchorages for fuel if necessary.

In Puerto Penasco I will be alongside for a few days and loading *Veleda* on the truck, after which I (we) can bus up to Tucson or Phoenix to fly back to Toronto. Judy may or may not come down to assist. We will be OK for our passage from Chicago to the North Channel Yacht Club in Spragge, Ontario in early May.

The transport by truck has not been finalized yet, but we should know within a week. There are international airports a taxi drive away from all the destinations we will be using.

I would appreciate 1 to 3 crew for each of the passages above. I am a bit limited as I am recovering from a torn tendon in the rotator cuff of my right shoulder, but it should be 90 % operational by mid Feb. hopefully.

Would you pass this on to other sailors you may know who might be available.
